**Saint Andrew's Anglican Church New Carlisle, P. Q.
Diocese of Quebec**

The first Protestant settlers who came to Canada in large numbers were also, like the French Canadians, a defeated people, and the churches played a vital role in helping them survive. These were the Loyalist refugees of the American Revolution who came flooding north in the 1780s. There were Anglican military and naval chaplains in Newfoundland and Nova Scotia before 1750, and the first Anglican Church in Canada was built at St. John's, Newfoundland in 1712. But the real beginning of Anglicanism in Canada came with the immigration of the Loyalists, who after spending some time in special refugee camps established by the British government at Pointe-aux-Trembles and Machiche near Trois Rivieres had the choice of settling in the Gaspé or Kingston.

One hundred seventy-one families chose to settle in the Gaspé, and on June 9, 1784 four ships and as many whaleboats left Quebec City for this area. Other Loyalists left Quebec for the Gaspé on their own or at a later date. The small fleet arrived at Paspébiac on June 29 after a long and hard voyage, and from there made their way to Petit Paspébiac, now called New Carlisle.

The following names are still in New Carlisle today: Allen, Astles, Beebe, Billingsley, Brown, Caldwell, Campbell, Chisholm, Chatterton, Coull, Dobson, Flowers, Fraser, Garrett, Gilker, Imhaugh (Imhoff), Law, Marsh, Munro, Thompson, Ross, Scott, Sherar, Starnes and others such as Anglehart, Brotherton, Busteed, Carroll, Cass, Connor, Cunnings, Doran, Fitzgerald, Fulham, Kennedy, Keys, Mackenzie, Mann, McCrae, McLellan, McLeod, McNeven, McPherson, Morin, Patterson, Price, Pritchard, Ritchie, Robertson, Travers, Willett, Williams, Robinson, and Simpson and found in other places along the coast.

Life was not easy for the first few years. The settlers were provided with supplies to June 30, 1785 and lots were drawn for land. It is noted that 194 men lined up for rations but only 171 attended the drawing of lots - spreading east or west according to their choice of better land or better fishing.

Settlers came to New Carlisle (named probably after Carlisle, New York which is one of the ten Carlisles on the map of North America) and began to prepare for the long winter by gathering fuel, fish and berries. Tents were not mentioned but tarpaulins and sailcloth must have been in great demand while the men hastily erected winter quarters on the beach or Common. Some stayed there many years according to tales handed down by oldest residents but gradually they selected suitable homesites on the upper slopes.

School and church were the next structures that had to be built. In 1785 a Benjamin Hobson established a school in New Carlisle, and according to tradition a log cabin served as the first Anglican Church. This cabin was located on the beach in the vicinity of the present Christian Brethren cemetery.

The first Anglican missionaries to visit the Gaspé Coast came at the end of the 18th. century. In 1793 Jacob Mountain was appointed Bishop of the newly created Diocese of Québec, and arrived in Québec City on November of the same year. The first missionaries to be stationed permanently on the Coast were sent from England by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. They were the Reverend J. Suddard to Gaspé in 1819 and the Reverend Richard Knagg to Paspébiac in 1821 to become the first priest in charge of New Carlisle.

George Jehoshaphat Mountain, the Bishop's son was made Archdeacon of Québec in 1821 and visited the Gaspé in 1824. It is recorded that the frame of the church in New Carlisle was up. As previously mentioned the first church was supposedly a log cabin on the Common - In the personal diaries of the Reverend George Milne he writes: **"Feb. 27, 1872 - Burial of John Secord Beebe - all service read in church and then the body was taken and interred at the Commons by his mother's grave. I was not able to go as very stormy."** This item would give creditability to the graveyard first being on the beach. **"March 29, 1869. After some conversation about changing burial ground to the Commons brought on by Mr. Sheppard and about schools, the meeting adjourned."**

In 1826 the first Anglican Church was erected on the present church site and named St. Andrew's. It was consecrated on July 31, 1856 by the Rt. Rev. George Jehoshaphat Mountain.

In 1837 the same Bishop Mountain visited the coast as Bishop of Montreal, but also in charge of the Diocese of Quebec. Of that visit he wrote: "***There were at this time but two clergymen within the limits holding charge of the counties of Bonaventure and Gaspé. The churches of Gaspé Basin, MalBaie, Perce, Paspébiac and New Carlisle, of which, except the last mentioned were unpainted and most of them a more or less incomplete state, were visited and confirmations were held in all of them.***" The first St. Andrew's remained in use until 1894 and was replaced by the present building - which was consecrated in 1897 by the Rt. Rev. Andrew Hunter-Dunn, fifth Bishop of Quebec.

A memorial of this original Deed of Bargain and Sale has been filed, entered, and registered in the Registry Office of the County of Bonaventure in Register A, Vol. 1, Page 250 at the hour of two in the afternoon of the first day of November in the year of our Lord, One thousand eight hundred and forty-four under the number four hundred and two. And the following is a copy of the said Memorial. A Memorial to be registered of a Deed of Bargain and Sale bearing date and the fifteenth day of May in the year of God, one thousand eight hundred and twenty, made between Robert Sherar, Esquire, of New Carlisle of the one part and the Honourable William Crawford; Thomas Sherar, Esquire; James Sherar, Esquire; Farquhar McRae, Esquire; and Amasa Beebe, Esquire, who are members of the committee mentioned in the said Deed, for the erecting of a church and parsonage house at New Carlisle in the Chaleur Bay, of the other part. By which said Deed of Bargain and Sale, the said Robert Sherar, for the considerations therein expressed, did grant, bargain, sell, and confirm unto the said William Crawford, Thomas Sherar, James Sherar, Farquhar McRae and Amasa Beebe and their heirs forever, that Town Lot in New Carlisle, aforesaid number in the plan of the same one hundred and thirty-five, sometimes called McKay's Lot, bounded on the south by the Main Street or King's Highway, on the west by the great Crop Street in the center of New Carlisle aforesaid, on the east by Town Lot number one hundred and thirty-four and on the north by Town Lot number one hundred and sixty-six, and with all his right title and interest thereto acquired by him by virtue of a Deed of Sale from Alexander McKay and

Mary Rose his wife, on the twenty-fourth day of November one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, to hold the said William Crawford, Thomas Sherar, James Sherar, Farquhar McRae and Amasa Beebe in trust as specified at length in the said Deed of Bargain and Sale now to be Registered, is witnessed by Benjamin Hobson, I.P.M. Crawford, James Gilker, Nicholas Renouf and James Assels, and the same Deed is required to be registered by the Reverend George Milne, clerk, one of the missionaries of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, present incumbent of said church and William Flowers and Alexander Hall, Church Wardens in whom the full hold of said church and church yard is vested by act of the Provincial Parliament Sixth of Victoria, chapter thirty-second, as witness their hands this first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and forty-four. Signed in presence of Thomas Willett, William Flowers, Alexander Hall and Edward LeLievre. George Milne, priest

 These items are concerning the progress of the church.*

July 28, 1850 - Service at Saint Andrew's - The Bishop preached. The church crowded and many standing on stairs and outside. His Lordship was much pleased with appearance of things in this mission and left a note to the church wardens of Carlisle approving of their exertions in getting the churchyard enclosed and promising some assistance toward finishing the church if people do their part.

April 26, 1859 - Meeting of vestry of Saint Andrew's Church, New Carlisle. Present Messrs C. Kelly, Sheppard, Wilkie, Vibert, Thomas Rees Kelly and McCoubrey. Accounts read as in book balance of hand 17 pounds, 1 shilling, 6 pence. Approved and passed. Remitted to church wardens to endeavour to get the lower part of tower ceiled and stairs made and gallery pews made. Mr. McCoubrey gave in a list of subscribers to the platform and amounts paid. Mr. McCoubrey also

stated that he wished to give up his engagement for taking care of the church as his year was up. This was said not to be the case as he commenced at the time when the bell was put up at the beginning of winter. The matter was referred to the church wardens and me. He had to go on as usual.

May 3, 1859 - Vestry meeting- Saint Andrew's - present Sheppard, Vibert, Billingsley, I. Kelly, Clarence Hamilton, J. Smith, Richard McCoubrey (schoolmaster) and Wilkie. Hamilton asked if delegate to synod could not be at last meeting to send one from this parish. The wardens and I then agreed to advertise for tenders to ceil the lower part of the tower, make stair, five pews in the gallery, securing the joists, to remove the old stair, and make a pew below. Contributions to furnish all materials and work if possible to be done before 5 July.

June 17, 1859 - Went with Mr. Vibert, church warden to arrange carpenters about stair in church tower.

January 12, 1860 - Meeting of collecting pew rents at Saint Andrew's and letting pews . Large meeting, nearly all paid and some arrears. Notice of law as to dogs in church. A constable to be appointed as to keep order.

April 17, 1860 - Vestry meeting - Saint Andrew's - Windows to be put in church and some work about doors, and to get a lock for outer door, and churchyard fence and gates. Church wardens to see to it.

May 20, 1860 - Got the Communion Plate for Saint Andrew's Church, N. C. from Mr. Briard. Cost 6 pounds.

April 3, 1863 - New communion table in chancel.

June 1, 1863 - Miss Kelly consulted me about collecting funds to get a carpet for Chancel. Approved of it and intended carpet - to give her size tomorrow.

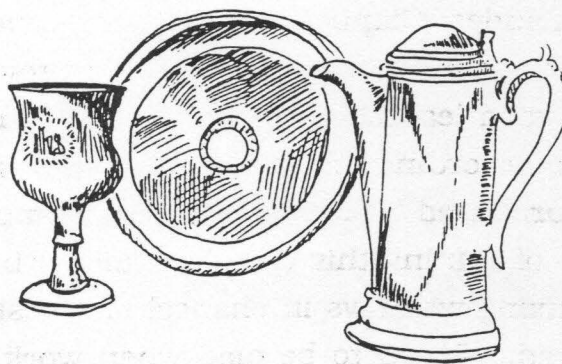
June 2, 1863 - Gave Miss Kelly dimensions of chancel within the rails -
15' 6" x 7' 8".

June 17, 1863 - Miss Kelly paid over to me the balance of subscriptions
raised by her for carpet which cost \$ 10.00.

March 28, 1869 - Meeting of vestry of Saint Andrew's, New Carlisle at
4 p.m. in church. The chairman read a circular regarding insurance of
churches and parsonages. Inquiries to be made. After some
conversation about changing the burial ground to the Commons brought
on by Mr. Sheppard and about schools, the meeting adjourned.

June 4, 1869 - Met with church wardens-resolved to insure in Queen
F. & L. office - measured distances of nearest building to church. From
street to church 87 and 1/2 feet. From church to schoolhouse 187
feet. To Mr. Beebe's 240 feet. No other buildings within 300 feet.

April 19, 1870 - Vestry meeting - Church has been insured for \$800.00,
premium of \$7.00 to be paid at proper time. It was ordered on my
motion that the parties wishing to dig graves in the churchyard must
notify the church wardens, and that the graves must be made not less
than five feet deep. Notice of which shall be put up on the church door.

 Were present: - Rev. Edgar Husband - Chairman
 Also Messrs. J.C. Hall, J.L. Smith, D. Law, Jas. Hall, Rbt. Caldwell, John
 Thompson, Jas. Chatterton, Edward Hall, Rbt. Assels. This meeting was
 called for the purpose of examining the plans of the New Church,
 received from Mr. Jarvis. It was agreed to accept them with a few
 alterations and to be returned to him for the same. The Building
 Committee relieves Mr. J. Hall, from all change of plans, Nos. 4, 5, and
 6 of New Church.

Revd. E. Husband to take charge of them for the present, it being
 agreed that nothing shall be done until the Committee receive the
 plans from Mr. Jarvis, after he has made the slight alternations
 required. (carried)

Meeting adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

Second Building

I, the undersigned, agree to finish the outside of the above New
 Church, (Tower excepted) for the sum of one hundred and thirty
 seven dollars (\$137.00) all materials except nails being found.
 The above work includes: Clapboarding - casing eaves - placing and
 making corner and base boards - leading roof at tower and chancel and
 vestry - shingling rood leading windows where required - building and
 altering buttresses according to plan., (as far as possible on north side)
 - all nails to be purchased by me - work to be completed in three
 months from time of signing this contract, and to be subject to
 inspection - also fixing windows in chancel and vestry, and placing one
 door where required. \$50.00 to be paid when work is half completed,
 the rest when work is finished and inspected.

The Parish Hall

A meeting of the Rectory Committee was held in the vestry on the 26th. of September, 1907. Present were the Reverend E. A. Dunn, Robert Assels, Robert Caldwell, Charles Cooke, John C. Hall, John Thompson and Fletcher Blois.

The minutes of the vestry meeting of the 16th., of September were read as relating to the new hall and horse shed. The first matter taken up was the size of the piece of land.

Mr. Sheppard agreed to give as a donation a further piece of land on the north boundary; at the western end a piece 6 feet; further north by 55 feet east and west.

This donation was accepted with a vote of thanks. Moved by Charles Cooke and seconded by John Thompson

The Parish Hall was built in 1910, renovated in 1950 and demolished in 1978
