### THE SCHOONERS "TRYAL"

#### FOREWORD

The tradition of naming a schooner "TRYAL" would appear to have been handed on to Gaspé shipbuilders and owners from New England, if not from Old England itself. Some confirmation of this is found in a Library of Congress manuscript, THE JOURNAL OF A CAPTIVE -1745-1748, to be found in the interesting volume of Isabel Calder's COLONIAL CAPTIVITIES, MARCHES AND JOURNEYS. The New Englander, Captain William Pote, Jr., who was taken a prisoner at sea by a French warship and carried off to a Québec prison, noted in his JOURNAL for June 24th., 1745:

"...Midsummer Day; fell in with 3 Fishing Schooners, 2 of which they (the French) took, vizt, the ENDEAVOUR, John Cox of Salem, the TRYALL, Joseph Dennen of Marblehead, the 3rd got away. The TRYALL was sunk and the ENDEAVOUR was Taken in Tow..."

Subsequently, from prison in Québec, Captain Pote recorded, on April 17th., 1746, the death of Captain Joseph Dennen, late Master of the TRYALL schooner

## THE SCHOONER "TRYAL" OF MAL BAY

The following Deed from the records of Notary Charles Stewart of Québec, dated 1798, will serve to recall not only the Gaspé schooner "TRYAL" but Gaspesian personalities of the time:

"Before the Notaries Public subscribing, personally appeared Mr. Daniel McPherson of Douglastown, District of Gaspé, at present in the City of Québec, of the one part and Messrs.

Lymburner and Crawford of the same City of Québec, Merchants and Copartners in trade, of the other part - Which said Daniel McPherson did, of his own free will and accord, Declare - That for and in Consideration of the sum of Two Hundred and thirty pounds Current money of this Province, to be paid in the manner hereinafter mentioned, Hath Granted, sold, released and confirmed- and hereby doth Grant, sell, release and confirm with Guarantee against all former sales, Gifts, Debts, Demands and Incumbrances whatsoever, all that certain Schooner called

Tryal of the burthen of fifty four forty four ninety fourth Tons as she now lays at Mr. Blackwood's Wharf and which he promises to deliver to the said Lymburner and Crawford at their Dock immediately after the execution hereof, in the same state, together with her Hull, Masts, Sails, Yards, Anchors, Cables, Ropes, Tackle and Apparel to the said Schooner appertaining or belonging, by whatever name or names the same is or are called or known or of whatever kind or quality the same may be and consist of -

To Have and to Hold the said Schooner Tryal, with her Hill, Masts, Sails, Yards, Ropes and all and singular her appurtenances whatever hereby Bargained, Sold and Conveyed, or intended so to be, unto them the said Lymburner and Crawford, their Heirs and Assigns, to the only proper use, benefit and ... of the said Lymburner and Crawford, their Heirs and Assigns from henceforth for ever and to which they are hereby intended to have a Legal right and property.

And further, He, the said Daniel McPherson, hereby promises and engages to furnish the said Lymburner and Crawford with a Bill of Sale of the said Schooner from the person or persons from whom he purchased her whenever He shall be thereunto required, and elects his domicile at Mr. James Tod's, St.Peter street, Québec, and Lymburner and Crawford at their House, St.Peter's Street, Québec. The Consideration money to be paid as follows - to wit - One Hundred barrels of flour common at twenty six shillings per Barrel - to be delivered immediately after the execution hereof and the sum of One Hundred pounds Current money aforesaid Granted to the said Daniel McPherson by the said Lymburner and Crawford in their Note of hand of this date and payable to the said Daniel McPherson, or his order, on or before the fifteenth of October next ensuing.

Which said Schooner obtained a Register at the Port of Carleton, District of Gaspee, on the first day of June last and which is here transcribed according to Act of Parliament -

In pursuance of an Act passed in the Twenty sixth year of the reign of King George the Third, intitled An Act for the further increase and encouragement of Shipping and Navigation, William Lucas and Fitzhugh Lucas of Mall Bay in the County of Gaspee and Province of Lower Canada, Mariners, having taken and subscribed the oath required

by this Act, and that they are sole owners of the ship or vessel called Tryal of Gaspee, whereof William Lucas is at present Master and that the said ship or vessel was Built at Mall Bay in the District of Gaspee and Province of Lower Canada this present year, One Thousand seven hundred and ninety eight

And James Durward having Certified to us that the said ship or vessel is British Plantation built, has one deck and two masts, that her length from the forepart of the main stem to the after part of the stern post aloft is fifty two feet, her breadth at the Broadest part, whether above or below the main wales, sixteen feet, and admeasures fifty four 44/94 Tons, that she is a Square sterned Schooner, has no Gallery and no head

And the subscribing Owners, having consented and agreed to the above description and admeasurement, and having caused sufficient security to be Given as is required by the said Act, the said Schooner, Tryal, has been duly registered at the Custom House at the Port of Carleton, District of Gaspee.

Given under our hands and seals of office at the Custom House in the said Port of Carleton this first day of June, One Thousand seven hundred and ninety eight.

INDORSED / We, the within mentioned William and Fitzhugh Lucas, have for valuable Consideration, sold, delivered and made over to Daniel McPherson of Gaspee our right, title and Interest of the within mentioned Schooner, Tryal. Witness our hands at Gaspee this Eighteenth day of June, 1798.

Which said Grant, Bargain, Sale and Conveyance they, the said Lymburner and Crawford did and heteby doth accept. This Done and Passed at Québec in the afternoon of the twenty sixth day of June, one thousand seven hundred and ninety eight, this Minute having been duly read to and subscribed by the parties in the office of Charles Stewart, one of the subscribing notaries, there to remain of record.

# THE SCHOONER "TRYAL" OF NEW CARLISLE

It is of interest to note that this account of the schooner TRYAL of New Carlisle is to be found in the records of Notary Public, L.T.McPherson, a son of the Daniel McPherson above. In 1802 Daniel McPherson had acquired the Seigniory of Crane Island in the St.Lawrence, off Montmagny. It was from there that his son Laughton Thomas went forth to complete his education, to qualify as a Notary Public, and to practice his profession in the City of Québec from 1816 onwards. The McPhersons maintained strong links with Gaspesia and the clients of L.T.McPherson included many Gaspesians, including James Sherar of New Carlisle, owner and Master of the schooner TRYAL of Bay Chaleur.

### BILL OF SALE - 07 NOVEMBER 1817

" On the Seventh Day of November in the Year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, Before us the undersigned Notaries Public, duly admitted and sworn for the Province of Lower Canada and residing in the City of Québec in the said Province, personally came, appeared and were present James Sherar Esq., of New Carlisle in the Province of Lower Canada, Merchant, now in the City of Québec, sole owner of the schooner or vessel called Tryal of the burthen of forty and 57/94 Tons register measurement, now lying in the Port of Québec who for and in consideration of the sum of Two Hundred Pounds, Current money of the said Province of Lower Canada, to him in hand at and before the execution of these presents, well and truly paid by Mr. James Lampriere Marett of the said City of Québec, Merchant, receipt whereof he doth hereby acknowledge as Quittance, did and by these presents doth grant, bargain, and sell, assign, transfer and set over, with guarantee or warranty against all hindrances and pretentions, with the said James Lampriere Marret, hereunto also present and accepting hereof for himself, his heirs and assigns, as follows

That is to say; the said Schooner or vessel called Tryal, together with all and singular the masts, sails, yards, anchors, cables, standing and running rigging, hawsers, boats, oars, tackle, apparel, furniture, appurtenances and dependencies whatsoever to the said

vessel or Schooner belonging or in any wise appertaining, which said vessel hath been duly registered at the Port of Québec, a Copy of the certificate of which is as follows, vizt.-

### Number Seventy two

In pursuance of an Act passed in the twenty sixth year of the reign of King George the third, intitled an Acr for the further Increase ans Encouragement of Shipping and Navigation, James Sherar of New Carlisle in the Province of Lower Canada, Trader, having taken and subscribed the oath required by this Act and having sworn that himself is sole owner of the ship or vessel called the Tryal of New Carlisle, whereof the deponent is at present Master, and that the said ship or vessel was built at New Carlisle aforesaid this present year, one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, which appears by certificate of Henry O'Hara, Esq., Deputy Collector at New Carlisle, bearing date the 27th September last and Charles G. Stewart. surveyor for the Navigation Act, Mr.H.P. Cole having certified to us that the said ship or vessel is British Plantation Built, has one Deck and two masts, that her length from the fore part of the main Stem to the after Part of the Stern Post aloft is Forty five feet. six inches, her breadth at the Broadest Part above the main wales fourteen feet eight inches and admeasures forty and 57/94 Tons; that she is a square sterned schooner with a quarter deck, has no gallery and no figure Head, and the said subscribing owner having consented and agreed to the above description and admeasurement and having caused sufficient security to be given, as is required by the said Act, the said schooner Tryal has been duly registered at the Port of Québec.

Given under our Hands and Seals of office at the Custom House in the said Port of Québec this Twenty fourth day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.

This done and passed in the said City of Québec at the office of L.T.McPherson, one of us the said Notaries, on the day and year first above written, In Faith and Testimony.

Whereof the said parties have to these presents, first duly read, set and subscribed their names and signatures in the presence of us the said Notaries hereunto subscribing.

### LATER DEEDS

While it is beyond the scope of this article to follow the career of the schooner TRYAL of New Carlisle it appears that the above change of ownership was but the first of several sales. One of the more interesting is reflected in a Deed of Procuration dated 13 November 1833 when she became the property of Louis Gamache, John Clark and Francois Fortard, all of the Island of Anticosti, Fishermen. A year later another Deed of Sale reflected other ownership.

### REGARDING JAMES SHERAR

A recall of the Sherar family of New Carlisle is planned for the GASPÉ OF YESTERDAY series but it seems appropriate, in the context of the above to provide a note on James Sherar. Eldest of the children of Thomas and Jeanne Melvin Sherar, James (1770-1846) was born in Scotland and was four years old when his parents emigrated to settle in New York Province in 1774. As a Loyalist, Thomas Sherar fled to Canada and joined the Loyal Rangers commanded by Major Edward Jessup. With his wife and family Thomas Sherar came to the Loyalist settlement in Bay Chaleur on the Brig. St.Peter in 1784.

In 1795 James Sherar married Margaret McVey at St. Andrew's

Presbyterian Church in the City of Québec. Their five sons and three daughters, would through marriage, link the families of Starnes, McNish, Hall, Ellis, McCabe, Enright and Smollett.

James Sherar, became widely known in Gaspesia and beyond as a merchant-trader, shipowner and Justice of the Peace for the District of Gaspé. He died in 1846 and was buried from St. Andrew's Anglican Church. His wife, Margaret, survived her husband for two decades and was 92 years of age when she died in 1866.

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
