GASPÉ GAZETTEFOREWORD

In the 1950's there was an interesting attempt to publish a "GASPÉ GAZETTE" featuring local news and views of the Gaspé area.

Some five years ago, in 1983, GASPÉ OF YESTERDAY sought to trace the origins of the GAZETTE and was directed to Mrs. Phyllis Townley, née Hyman, of London, Ontario, but formerly of Gaspé, who wrote, in part :

"...Your letter regarding the GASPÉ GAZETTE brought back a lot of memories !

The publishing of this paper was pretty much a one-woman affair - me - with the assistance of my mother who gathered a lot of the news by telephone for me - Lewis MacKenzie who wrote most of the editorials - Bobby Baker, Cartoonist, - Clive Briand, Correspondent from Douglas town - a chap named Roger who worked for Gaspé South Elec. Coop, who printed it, or rather, ran it on his mimeograph machine every Friday night for \$5.00 ! A lot of people would phone their social news in as it was fun to see their names in print and a lot of copies were sent to relatives living away from Gaspé to keep them up to date.

I would spend Thursday and Friday typing it, Friday night running it off and then bring it home to the dining room table where my mother and Bruce (now my husband) and I would staple it together. Saturday A.M. I would deliver it to the stores for sale at 10 cents a copy. I also sold the advertising space..."

FOREWORD

An attempt was made in the autumn of 1983 to locate copies of the GAZETTE. To that end the following LETTER TO THE EDITOR was sent to the Gaspé representative of SPEC, Mr.D.Sams, seeking his cooperation in bringing it to public attention:

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Some thirty years or more ago there was published in Gaspé the weekly, GASPE GAZETTE - Local News of York, Wakeham, Sandy Beachm Brasset, Gaspé. The editor and publisher was Miss Phyllis Hyman, now Mrs Bruce Townley of London, Ont. It is known that at least twenty-nine issues appeared - possibly more.

This is an appeal to Gaspésians who may have copies of the GASPE GAZETTE for the period of 1951 onward to advise me of the edition number or numbers that they have. To that end would they please phone the SPEC office in Gaspé Basin and advise the SPEC representative as to the copies they have. I will be in touch with them regarding access to their copies.

As a chronicle of the people and events of the time in Gaspé the GASPE GAZETTE is of unique interest. It is hoped that most of the issues can be found and recalled in today's weekly, SPEC

2nd. SHIPMENT OF GASPE CODFISH TO ITALY

The second shipment of Gaspé Dry Codfish for the Italian market was loaded Thursday night on board the S/S "Cygnus", a Norwegian ship chartered by the Fabre Line of France. This shipment consisted of 5,017 cases of salt cod, each case containing 100 pounds. Shippers were Messrs. Robin Jones and Whitman Limited, 2,000 cases, Quebec United Fishermen, 2,000 cases, General Sea Products (Quebec) Limited, 556 cases and Messrs. Wm. Hyman & Sons Limited, 461 cases. The "Cygnus" sailed from this port yesterday for Genoa, Italy where she is expected to arrive on the 20th. of October.

PETER KINGSTON PREACHES FIRST SERMON.

The Rev. Peter B. Kingston, B.A. preached for the first time since his ordination to the ministry of the Church last Sunday morning at 11.A.M. Choral Eucharist in St. Matthew's Church, Quebec City. The new Anglican Deacon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L.B. Kingston of Quebec and has been a member of St. Matthew's Parish since his boyhood when he moved to Quebec with his parents. Prior to leaving Quebec for his studies at Bishop's University and his duties with the Royal Canadian Air Force he was a Choir Boy and Server at St. Matthew's and also helped in the Sunday School.

Mr. Kingston took his Theology at Queen's College, Birmingham, England and at the Montreal Diocesan Theological College. He spent three years in the R.C. A.F. reaching the rank of Flying Officer and serving in Canada and England.

While serving on the Gaspe Coast under the direction of Archdeacon E.S. Reed during the past summer, Mr. Kingston heard of the vacancy in the Magdalen Islands Mission and volunteered to go to this difficult post. He was ordained by Archbishop Philip Carrington on October 18th. and left for the Magdalen Islands last Sunday. Mr. Kingston will be accompanied to his new duties by the daughter of a former Missionary on the Magdalene Islands. His wife, prior to their marriage in Perce in August, was Miss Joan Warren and is the daughter of Rev. A.R. Warren.

TWO TOWED SHIPS SINK NEAR GASPE

Two crewless ships being towed from Sydney, N.S. to Quebec by the Foundation Lillian sank during an Atlantic storm midway between Cape North, N.S. and Gaspe.

The Baxter Dick and the Reynard were to have been scrapped at a Quebec shipyard. The Baxter Dick sank first and dragged the Reynard under with her. The Foundation Lillian cut her cables to avoid the same fate.

The Reynard, built as a warship during the first war was later bought by the Vanderbilts and converted into a yacht. During the second war it was repurchased by the Government and once again used by the U.C.N.

Reheat and serve at once as oyster stew
is apt to curdle upon standing. Serves
four.

4 tbsp. fat, 4 tbsp. flour, 1 slice on-
