James Paterson, Master Mariner

Another Paterson in Gaspe around 1800 emerges from the pages of history: James Paterson, Master Mariner, and Commander of the Government Schooner St. Lawrence.,

In a land claim before the Gaspe Land Commission in 1819, Robert Simpson asked for title to lots of land #34, 35 and 36 on the North West Arm of Gaspe Bay (present day Peninsula). Simpson claimed he had occupied the lots in question for 12 years and that he purchased the land from a James Paterson. In the same claim, it is stated that Paterson purchased the lands from a Josiah Whitley in 1801.¹

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Whitley had obtained the land in a claim before the Gaspe Land Board in 1790.²

Questions have arisen. Who was this James Paterson? Was he a relative of the Paterson family already settled in the area? Very little evidence has been found.

A ship manifest from 1802 shows that Paterson was a Captain and that he was in Gaspee in August of that year. ³ The name of the ship is not recorded.

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The only other evidence that has been found is the death certificates of both James and his wife Martha. They show that he was the Commander of the Government Schooner St. Lawrence. James died in 1812 and his wife in 1815. Both were buried in the cemetery of St. Andrews Presbyterian Church, Quebec City.⁴

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The congregation, known as the Scottish Congregation, was founded in 1759, by Scottish settlers in Quebec, including members of the 78th Fraser Highlanders. Construction on the church began in 1807 and was completed in 1810.⁵ The fact that both James and Martha were

buried in the Scottish cemetery indicates that both were natives of Scotland or were of Scottish origin. Could this be evidence of a family connection to John Paterson, Pioneer of the York River, and a native of Scotland? Did James have any contact with the Paterson family living in Gaspe at that time? It seems likely. We know that he bought land in 1801 but we do not know if he was present at Gaspe that year. We do know that he was there in August of 1802. With so few permanent settlers in the Gaspe Bay area at that time, it seems likely that he did have some interaction with John Paterson, among others.
