
Kitchen Family of Gaspe

Cumberland was a small county in the north-western the part of England, bordering on Scotland and facing the Irish Sea. In 1974 it, along with a couple of other counties, combined to become the new county of Cambria which is as the Lake District. Cumberland's position made it the scene of constant invasion by Norsemen, Vikings and Scots, and later, the region endured constant battles between the English and Scottish. Only after the Jacobite rebellion of 1745 did the region become closely affiliated with England and gradually became somewhat civilized.

The Kitchen roots were well established in the southern part of the county, as records show that the Kitchen family had resided there for some 250 years. After the "Dissolution of the monasteries," around 1540, King Henry VIII disbanded the Catholic institutions and sold the properties. 1 It would appear that one of these properties, referred to as "Grounds," came to be known as Kitchen Grounds. Since Irton parish registers don't exist before 1680 we know little of the earliest inhabitants. It is believed that Christopher

Kitchen (circa 1580-1622), a Yeoman farmer, was one of the earliest members of the Kitchen family living in Irton.²

In the 13th century the Augustinian monks founded St. Paul's Church in Irton. The present-day structure was constructed in 1857, replacing the medieval building. It is very unusual, situated on a ridge in a rural area surrounded by scattered farms and hamlets east of the village of Holmrook.³ There is no central village in Irton. In the churchyard stands the famous Irton Cross, dating from the 9th century.⁴

Subsistence farming was the only way to survive outside the large urban centers in the



eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. Evidently the Kitchen descendants were numerous, as in Irton and the surrounding area alone, there are thousands of birth records for people with the name Kitchin, usually spelled with an "I." The forefathers of the Kitchin family of Gaspe resided in this region of north-western England.

Below left, is a map of England, showing Cumberland County in red. To the right is a detailed map of Cumberland County, and the red dot is the approximate location of Irton.





John Suddard, likely of Cumberland County or the neighboring Lancashire County, was ordained into the ministry of

the Anglican Church. He was assigned to Lower Canada (now Quebec) under Bishop Mountain. For some time, the Gaspe region had been requesting a minister because the English population was growing significantly. In 1820 Rev. Suddard was assigned to the Gaspe area and took up residence in Gaspe Basin.⁵ Shortly thereafter, John's brother, Thomas Suddard with his wife, **Bridget Kitchin** (Born about 1790), and their five children settled in Gaspe as well.

Around the same time, four other people with the family name "Kitchin" arrived in Gaspe. They were **Isaac Kitchin** (Born about 1795), **Elizabeth Kitchin** (Born 2 Apr 1807), **Jane Kitchin** (Born 28 March 1808), and **Hannah Kitchen** (Born 29 April 1808). From the parish records of Cumberland County, it is clear that Elizabeth, Jane, and Hannah are daughters of Isaac Kitchin and Eleanor Borrowdale. Only the father is listed on the birth certificates of Isaac and Bridget, though, in both cases the father name was Isaac Kitchin. Most genealogists include all five people in family, but I was unable to locate any concrete evidence. For the balance of this report,

though it hasn't been confirmed, they will be assumed to be one family, and the spelling "Kitchen," (with an "e") will be used, as it was adopted upon their arrival in Gaspe. The complete family is found in Appendix 1

Since most of these Kitchen arrivals were girls, it wasn't long before the Kitchen name was lost in Gaspe, but without a doubt, many Gaspesians have descended from this family. All five married Gaspesians, and had a total of 43 children. An excellent source for tracing your Kitchen ancestry to this family is "Our Gaspe Roots," found in the history section of GoGaspe.com.

Tracing their ancestors has proven very difficult, if not impossible. If one searches the multitude of family trees on Ancestry.com or other sources, they will frequently find several generations of ancestors listed. But either the records they used have eluded me, or these researchers have not properly checked their sources. From weeks of searching parish records, it is certain that the parents of Elizabeth, Jane and Hannah are indeed Isaac Kitchen and Eleanor Borrowdale. But then the trouble begins.

In or near Irton, there were at least four children born in the early 1760's with the name "Isaac Kitchen," who could be the father of Isaac. Selecting the right one would require locating a surviving original document from 250 years ago. The Marriage Bond⁷ of Isaac and Eleanor could be the key. [see Appendix 2] The marriage Bond begins, "Know all men by these presents, that we Isaac Kitchen and John Borradaile Yeoman and both of Irton, in the Parish of Irton and County of Cumberland..." This document is dated "the twenty eighth day of November in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and eighty eight," which is about a week before their marriage. It goes on to say that Isaac was "aged 23 years and upwards" and Eleanor was "aged 23 years." Isaac Kitchen signed the bond with clear cursive writing, demonstrating that he could read and write, and John Borradaile signed with his mark. Despite the fact that all the family trees I have viewed on Ancestsry.com show Isaac's father as Henry, and Eleanor's father as William, this marriage bond would imply that their fathers were Isaac and John respectively.

If we accept that as being correct, then the birth of our Isaac Kitchen could be 10 Nov 1765 in Gosforth, Cumberland, England, son of John Kitchen.⁸ That would make him 23 years of age when he married, and his father, John would match the marriage bond. Without further investigation no firm conclusion can be made, except that the Gaspesian Kitchen descendants almost certainly descended from the "Kitchens" who purchased "Kitchen Grounds," located in northwest England.

Eleanor Borrowdale is equally difficult to trace. The only matching birth record the I've located on either Ancestry or Family Search, is that of Eleanor, daughter of John "Borradal" and Margaret from 1771 in Westmorland. That would make her only 17 at the time of her marriage to Isaac. Since the marriage bond specifically states her age at the time was 23, it remains doubtful that this is her birth record. As mentioned earlier, most others who have searched for answers to this puzzle have assumed that Eleanor's father was William. So, the mystery remains.

It can be surmised that the Borrowdale family originated in the Borrowdale Valley, centrally located in the mountainous region of Cambria. This area is famous for tourism, with attractions like the Bowder Stone, Castlerigg Stone Circle, and the Borrowdale Yews, enticing visitors from the more populous south.

The Castlerigg circle would remind one of the more famous Stonehenge of southern England. It is a ring of 38 stones within a ring of mountains. It was created by Neolithic farming communities


around 4,500 years ago. The Borrowdale Yews are three ancient twisted trees that stand out in the Borrowdale Valley as being very unusual. Together, these three curiosities have attracted tourists to this beautiful mountainous region of northern England for centuries.



Descendants of these five children of Isaac and Eleanor would now number in the thousands, though the family name was lost. Despite the fact that life would have been as harsh as in their homeland, most remained in Gaspe and raised large families. Appendix 3 provides a list of the 43 grandchildren of Isaac and Eleanor.
